

### Denied Admission Scenarios, Action Plans, and Risks

#### I was denied admission because...

<p>I did not have all <b>required courses</b> completed within the required timeline. I have the required GPA and units.</p>	<ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>1. I met the GPA requirement and successfully completed all of the required courses within the required timeline.</p>	<p>Plan A If you were short by 6 units or less then: Check to see if there are any available, transferable, late start classes at SBCC or another community college or university for the current term. If yes, enroll in the course/s and then submit an appeal for the term you were denied.</p> <p style="text-align: center;"><b>or</b></p> <p>Plan B 1. Check to see if SBCC has a <a href="#">TAG</a> with the university, what the requirements are, and if you can fulfill the requirements..</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>2. Identify: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>- the number of transferable units you need to complete, the courses you will take, and the term the courses need to be completed by</li> <li>- the grades you need to receive in these courses</li> <li>- how many terms it will take you to complete the courses and</li> <li>- when you need to submit the required TAG application and the university application.</li> </ul> </li> <li>3. Meet with a counselor to create a new Student Education Plan.</li> <li>4. Decide if you are OK with your revised transfer timeline or if you want to choose other options.</li> </ol>	<p>Plan A You won't be able to find courses to make up the missing units. You will not do well in the additional units and your GPA will drop below the GPA required for admission. Your appeal will be denied</p> <p style="text-align: center;"><b>or</b></p> <p>Plan B The admission requirements for a subsequent term could change and require a higher GPA and additional or different courses from the ones you have identified adding even more time before you can transfer or in the case of the GPA make you ineligible for transfer to your university.</p> <p>As you complete the additional courses your GPA might decrease, especially if you have not already completed the most challenging courses, and you could end up not having the required GPA for admission.</p>

Scenario Three	Action Plan	Risks
I did not have the <b>required GPA</b> for admission but I did have the required units and the courses.	<ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>1. You need to know your current transferable GPA and current transferable units. If you are not sure, then meet with a counselor to evaluate your transcripts.</li> <li>2. Check to see if SBCC has a <a href="#">TAG</a> with the university, what transferable GPA is required.</li> <li>3. Use the <a href="#">WSU GPA Calculator</a> at <a href="http://advising.wichita.edu/lasac/gpacalc/wsugpa.html">http://advising.wichita.edu/lasac/gpacalc/wsugpa.html</a> to determine the number of units and the grades in those units you will need to meet the required GPA for admission. (Note: Credit = Unit).</li> <li>4. Know that you know how many units and the grades you need to receive you can realistically assess if it is possible/likely for you to raise your GPA to meet the admission standard and how many terms it will take.</li> <li>5. Decide if you are OK with your revised transfer timeline or if you want to choose other options.</li> <li>6. If you are OK with your revised transfer timeline, then meet with a counselor to create a new Student Education Plan that identifies: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>- the number of transferable units you need to complete, the courses you will take, and the term the courses need to be completed by</li> <li>- the grades you need to receive in these courses</li> <li>- how many terms it will take you to complete the courses and</li> <li>- when you need to submit the required TAG application and the university application.</li> </ul> </li> <li>7. If you are not OK with the new timeline, chose other options and meet with a counselor to outline your next steps.</li> </ol>	<p>The admission requirements for a subsequent term could change and require a higher GPA and additional or different courses from the ones you have identified adding even more time before you can transfer or in the case of the GPA make you ineligible for transfer to your university.</p> <p>As you complete the additional courses your GPA might decrease, especially if you have not already completed the most challenging courses, and you could end up not having the required GPA for admission.</p>
<b>Scenario Four</b>	<b>Action Plan</b>	<b>Risks</b>
Any combination of the following: I did not have the <b>required GPA</b> for admission. I did not have the <b>required minimum units</b> completed within the required timeline. I did not have all <b>required courses</b> completed within the required timeline.	Identify which areas you need to address and follow the Action Plan for each area.	Same as listed above.
<b>Scenario Five</b>	<b>Action Plan</b>	<b>Risks</b>
I applied to a <b>selective university</b> that does not have defined admission requirements that guarantee admission.	<ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>1. Complete the <a href="#">My One and Only University worksheet</a> to determine your next steps.</li> <li>2. Decide if you are comfortable with the very real possibility of investing more time at SBCC and ending up in the same situation one year later – denied admission.</li> </ol>	If you are considering reapplying to a selective university that does not have a set of specific requirements that will guarantee your admission then you are taking a huge risk that you will be denied again. You need to determine if you are comfortable with that risk.
<b>Scenario Six</b>	<b>Action Plan</b>	<b>Risks</b>
I had too many units (senior standing) because I completed upper-division units at a four-year university in addition to attending community college.	1. Select another university to apply to that accepts senior transfers or return to your original four-year university. Most likely options would be most CSU campuses, private universities, and some out-of-state universities. Note: UC Irvine admits senior transfers.	NA
